3 Buildings at Risk

In Autumn 2015, your Society, alarmed at the continued neglect of the Island's built heritage, offered to host a meeting with like-minded groups to discuss what might be done to highlight and promote awareness of the plight of vulnerable buildings.

As a result, a network has been formed which already includes all the active Heritage Trusts on the Island and national groups such as the Victorian Society, Steam Railway Supporters Association, and of course the Antiquarians. The mission is to draw the Nations' attention to buildings of architectural or historic value, and what's at risk; and to encourage and support Government, Planners and Developers to return to best practice (which sometimes need not cost much more than neglect).

It is absolutely recognised that, with rare exceptions, buildings cannot just be preserved – the ideal result is often if a building can be adapted to provide a sustainable use without damage to the important features. Key to this is the availability of conservation support to/within the Planning & Building Control Directorate and to owners/developers; and recognition of buildings of value and their registration if appropriate.

Starting on Tues 24th May, a fortnightly series of features is being carried in the IOM Examiner (for which we are grateful to IOM Newspapers) comprising features by Simon Artymiuk (the Society's Hon. Publicity Secretary) on buildings great and small, visible and hidden – which are at risk, which have found sustainable saviours, and those we have lost through private and/or government neglect. These features are being accompanied by articles highlighting the importance of our built heritage, how it can be sustainably conserved, and issues with Planning and Registered Building and ways in which these might be improved.

Along with other groups, such as Culture Vannin's "Building Conservation Forum", we hope these various campaigns will promote awareness of, and spark debate on, Manx built heritage; and we would urge members – especially in the run up to the General Election on 22nd September – to take any opportunity to raise public awareness of the threats to our built heritage and the need for improvements to our Registered Building and Planning systems.

4 Planning

The Society continues to monitor and comment on planning applications where appropriate, including objecting to the as-yet-undetermined application to remove Lorne House in Castletown from the Register of protected buildings.

The remains of Ballaughton Manor, which is still the subject of an unresolved Registered Building proposal, have been the subject of several recent planning applications. The original redevelopment proposals, which included removal of much of the building but left the majority of the key front rooms intact, gained planning approval in 2015. However, a new application has recently been submitted to complete the demolition of the remaining rooms, principally based on the exterior masonry paint containing traces of asbestos which might be hazardous to the inhabitants or workmen in the future. Unfortunately, despite our objection, this too received approval, although it was conceded that things might have been different if Ballaughton had made it onto the Protected Buildings Register. Importantly though, as a result of our objection, for the first time ever the Society was granted 'Interested Party' status for this latter application - we hope this is a welcome sign from the Planning Committee / Planning & Building Control Directorate. Your Committee took the decision that the Society would exercise the right conferred by 'Interested Party' status and lodge an appeal against the latest planning application – any member who would like more details please contact Pat Newton or Dave Martin.

- a possible new Treasure Act (including suggesting a unified code for <u>all</u> archaeological finds)
