Welcome to our Autumn 2021 newsletter. Excursions

Excursions this summer were able to go ahead as planned both once a month at weekends and with three midweek outings albeit numbers attending were perhaps disappointingly low on some occasions, natural history being hardest hit. While weather and COVID may account for some of this, it would be interesting to get any other feedback. Are Saturday rather than Sunday afternoons suitable for most? Is the variety right? Do you have any topics you would wish to see covered? And above all, would you be willing to lead an excursion or do you know someone else, whether or not a member, who would? From Ballaugh village trades with its unusually wide crossroads and a car owned by a Quayle which had been driven by Errol Flynn in the North to the sights and sounds of The Sound seals and a long distance view of a minke whale and the Langness arch and unconformity in the slightly foggy South, from the bracken covered slopes towards remote Lag Ny Killey in the west and the dormant bats of Laxey in the east, albeit the number of species on the Island has now been recognisably increased from seven, we were able to gather up-to-date information on interpretation of known sites and different viewpoints.

Over the slopes of West Baldwin and around Ballacosnahan Farm we were very grateful to private landowners for welcoming us and giving us access to variously interpret one of our treens and its remains in the form of tholtans in the context of the physical environment, and learn of the possible links to the Guinea triangle of trading and the immense suitability of the Patrick slopes for Loaghtyn sheep farming.

Maughold slopes had a murderous past with a long term unsolved crime and open case. Finally the Society took part in Heritage Open Days where Hidden Cringle revealed a surprising number of crofters involved in the sea with fisherman and pilots, not pirates or slavers, abounding. Updated Rules


As previously advised, the Committee has been working with the Attorney General's chambers (who regulate Charities on the Isle of Man) on updating the Society's Rules. When we had the first lockdown, we approached to AG to request consent to introduce an absolute minimal set of changes to maximise resilience if situations similar to the recent lockdowns re-occurred, however the AG indicated that before any change would

be allowed, the updated Rules would need to comply with the recently updated Charities Act & Regulations. Since then the Committee has spent much time drafting and meeting, on their own and with the AG's chambers, and have come up with an updated version of the Rules which the AG found acceptable; this updated version is being placed before the members at an EGM before the lecture on 20th November, the papers for this EGM are enclosed with this mailing.

'Favourite of Fortune'

This year is the 250th anniversary of the birth of Captain John Quilliam RN HK. Two of the principal celebrations of this anniversary are a biography 'Favourite of Fortune' and a special stamp issue. The book 'Favourite of Fortune' is by three authors, all with deep knowledge of the Royal Navy of Quilliam's time – Andrew Bond, IoMNHAS's Frank Cowin, and Professor Andrew Lambert. Released this summer, it is available in all good bookshops on the Island, and is a readable, real treasure trove.

The stamps, designed by Colleen Corlett, were issued on 25th September. Exquisitely detailed, they depict key moments in Quilliam's life: his christening at St Runius and burial at Arbory, on a mission to China, the battles of Camperdown and Trafalgar, taking 'Thetis' whose prize money made Quilliam a rich man, and his association with the old House of Keys in which he served the Island.















Building Conservation and Planning

Our environment (natural and built), and our built heritage, remains at risk. The Society continues to make representations on planning applications. The Society has also made a number of submissions on proposals to add buildings to the Protected Buildings Register, for which there is an immense backlog. The Society has also made representations on the need to progress Conservation Areas, a number of which have been scandalously outstanding for decades.

Our fortnightly double-page 'Buildings at Risk' article series in the *Isle of Man Examiner*, which we publish under the Alliance for Building Conservation (ABC), continues. We originally set out to publish six articles in the run-up to the 2016 Manx General Election – but there was so much more to say that we carried on, and we have just published article number 133.
